## SCOPE AND CONTENT

This collection consists of a correspondence between Joseph R. Clark and Rogers Clark regarding Company C of the 27<sup>th</sup> Connecticut Volunteers. Included in the collection is the original envelope of the correspondent with an engraving of the *Monitor* on the front and the original letter of the correspondent written on *Monitor* letterhead.

The letter, dated 26<sup>th</sup> December 1862, is addressed to Uncle Rogers (Rogers Clark) and is written on behalf of John G. Clark by Joseph R. Clark who, at the time of the letter, is camped near Falmouth, Virginia. Joseph reports that John has fallen ill after a march from Camp Tuttle into a battle "All for nothing". Joseph believes John has remained ill due to the poor diet the soldiers must endure and remarks how many of the soldiers have also become sick due to the strain of battle and lack of decent nutrition. Though the winter had already set upon them, the soldiers started to build log huts for the rest of the season, hoping that a solid shelter would help protect them from the elements. At the end of his letter, Joseph Clark tells Rogers Clark that [Joseph], Alman E. Clark and James Beard (who could potentially be James W. Baird according to the Regimental History list of Volunteers) have all played a part in John Clark's recovery and requests that in addition to prayers for safe return that Rogers send "Good Black Tea, Crushed sugar and Bat Ess Peppermint".

### **BIOGRAPHICAL/HISTORICAL SKETCH**

The article from August 1989 issue of *The Gun Report* entitled "The Sword of Lieutenant Charles B. Brooks" by Robert M. Lawrence is principally about Lt. Brook's involvement in Company C of the 27<sup>th</sup> Connecticut Volunteers and includes information of the battles Company C encountered in 1862 and 1863. None of the soldiers mentioned in the letter are specifically mentioned in this article.

The 27<sup>th</sup> Connecticut Volunteers Regimental History relates the formation, early battles and includes a list of soldiers who participated in the regiment, to include Company C. The regiment was formed in October 1862. Joseph and John's stay at Camp Tuttle in November of 1862 is expanded upon as well as the battle mentioned in the letter. A list is given at the end of the chapters in which all the soldiers in descending order by rank are given and include all Privates mentioned in the letter, though a difference in name spelling imply that the James Beard mentioned in Joseph's letter may actually be James Baird or perhaps William Beard.

Private John G. Clark died December 30th, 1862, in General Hospital, Washington of disease.
