

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



Spotlight on an artifact

In the late 1800s under Kaiser Wilhelm II's rule, Germany turned its attention to lessening the gap between Germany's Navy and those of other leading countries. They began building some of the grandest ships to cross the Atlantic, including the steamship in the above painting, named for Germany's leader, *Kaiser Wilhelm II* of the North German Lloyd Line.

This painting is a unique and symbolic view of the *Kaiser Wilhelm II* in front of the Great Pyramids of Egypt. As the *New York Times* posted in 1903, "this ship is a feat which but a few years ago was beyond the range of human imagination." The Great Pyramids stand as a testament to the greatness mankind can achieve, just as the *Kaiser Wilhelm II* did in its time.

The piece was painted by Atelier (studio) Bollhagen, owned by Otto Bollhagen in Bremen, Germany. Although the original use of the painting is unknown, it may have been on the ship as Otto Bollhagen was commissioned to paint many of the works on *Kaiser Wilhelm II*. The painting could also have been created as an advertising piece at fairs, perhaps even the St. Louis

World Fair of 1904 where *Kaiser Wilhelm II* was the centerpiece of the North German Lloyd display. This ship just had its maiden voyage the year before, and it was in 1904 that she won the Blue Riband for the fastest transatlantic journey, a record she would hold until 1907.

Kaiser Wilhelm II would continue to make transatlantic journeys until 1914, when war broke out in Europe. She took refuge in New York's harbor until the U.S. entered the war in 1917 and commandeered the ship for use, renaming it USS Agamemnon. The ship was not used again and was sold for scrap in 1940—a sad, but typical, fate for vessels.

Although the origins of this painting remain a mystery, there is hope of discovering them one day and continuing research efforts. It is also hoped that sometime in the future the piece can be conserved so that it can be put on display for visitors to enjoy.



The Mariners' Museum's extensive collections are not only a valuable resource for the Museum's programs, but also for the exhibitions of other institutions.

Over the past couple of months, collections management staff worked with the staff of the Minnesota Marine Art Museum on identifying objects related to the history of tattooing for an exhibition planned for late 2016. The exhibition at MMAM will feature more than 31 items from the Mariners' object and archival collections.

Liguid Light PHOTOGRAPHY BENEATH THE SEA

New exhibition open August 22 - January 31, 2016

There is a world beneath the sea unlike anything seen on land. Starting August 22, visitors can explore these ocean depths in a new underwater photography exhibition.

Featuring the works of 10 West Coast artists, *Liquid Light* uses black-and-white media to capture a quality of light that exists only underwater. "Their work portrays the beauty of light and the mystery of life under the sea," Chief Curator Lyles Forbes said.

Visitors will be amazed by the wildlife portrayed in their natural habitat. Manta rays glide through the water, fish called Akule create amazing shapes from coordinated schools and rock fish swim confidently under the waves.

Many of the pieces in the exhibition bring an awareness to the fragile oceans, with multiple images that represent the connection between humans and the sea. Wayne Levin uses his photography to "encourage further awareness of the fragility of this amazing world, and the present threat to its very existence," as said in his artist statement for *Liquid Light*.

The Mariners' receives two environmental education grants

The Mariners' Museum staff is excited to announce the awarding of two new grants that will support environmental education programming. A \$2,500 grant from Virginia Natural Gas/AGL Resources, along with a grant of \$6,000 from Virginia Dominion Power, will provide support for supplies, curriculum and transportation. This educational programming will be implemented in partnership with the Boys and Girls Club of the Virginia Peninsula, and will teach participants about the importance of environmental stewardship through the development of their own wildlife habitats.

Students from Clubs in Newport News will participate in a series of programs that will begin in September 2015 and run through the entire school year. Programming will be held at both the Museum and at Boys and Girls Club locations to encourage learning outside of their normal activities. Each session will focus on a different topic related to the Chesapeake Bay, culminating with the creation of a wildlife habitat at each Club location.

The goal of the program is to encourage lifelong environmental stewardship among young people. A big thank you to the Museum's corporate partners for their valuable support!

Museum welcomes John V. Quarstein and the USS *Monitor* Foundation

Since 1987, The Mariners' Museum has been the official repository for the *Monitor* collection. The collection consists of more than 200 tons of priceless artifacts recovered from the iconic Civil War ironclad, located within the boundaries of NOAA's *Monitor* National Marine Sanctuary. In 2007, the Museum and its partners at NOAA opened the USS *Monitor* Center to rave reviews.

The creative interpretation of original artifacts, combined with personal letters and other archival materials, proved to be an award-winning and awe-inspiring combination.

Earlier this year, the Museum created a separate non-profit, USS *Monitor* Foundation, to address the long-term funding

needs of this vibrant Center. The USS Monitor Foundation has an ambitious goal of raising \$20 million in five years to support all aspects of the USS Monitor Center over the next two decades including artifact treatment, exhibit revitalization, programs and more.

Historian and author John V. Quarstein, who served 30 years as the Director of the Virginia War Museum in Newport News, Virginia, has been named by The Mariners' Museum as the Chief Development Officer of the USS *Monitor* Foundation.

Quarstein brings 37 years of museum experience to the USS *Monitor* Foundation. He was responsible for several major Civil War preservation projects for the City of Newport News including Lee Hall Mansion, Lee's Mill Battlefield Park and Endview Plantation. Quarstein also served

as an advisor to the USS *Monitor* Center during the exhibit development phase of the project.

Author of 15 books and six PBS documentaries, Quarstein has written three books about Civil War ironclads for The Mariners' Museum. Elliot Gruber, president & CEO of The Mariners' Museum, noted that Quarstein's "deep passion for Civil War naval history, particularly the Battle of Hampton Roads, made him the right person to develop greater awareness and new funding sources for the USS *Monitor*." Quarstein himself reflected that "it is such a privilege to have this opportunity to use my Civil War ironclad knowledge and museum development skills to ensure the future success of the USS *Monitor* Center and its Foundation."

Quarstein began work at the USS *Monitor* Foundation on May 1 and has already secured the first major gift of \$50,000 from the Krupp Family of Boston, Massachusetts. In his new position, Quarstein will spearhead national and international fundraising efforts and cultivation events for the Foundation, raising awareness for USS *Monitor* and its conservation.

USS *Monitor* replica gets a face-lift

The full-size replica of USS *Monitor* has been a major feature of the USS *Monitor* Center since its christening in 2006. Hundreds of thousands of Museum visitors have walked her top deck and many more have gazed at the unique vessel from overlooks on the Noland Trail and Warwick Boulevard. At 173-feet long, this formidable evocation of the Union ironclad proudly helps tell the tales of USS *Monitor* and the Battle of Hampton Roads.

Newport News Shipbuilding's Apprentice School deserves much of the credit for this amazing creation. Apprentices produced plans of the vessel and assembled the entire

replica. The USS *Monitor* replica has served proudly since that day, but the elements have been unkind to the physical structure. The steel plates and paint were exposed to bright light, extremely high heat, pounding rain, heavy snowfall and even tropical storms. As a result, the replica has lost its luster.

Recently, Newport News Shipbuilding agreed to provide in-kind support to address the condition of the replica. Later this year, shipyard employees and contractors from UHP Projects will remove the peeling layers of paint from the main deck and turret. The crew will apply multiple layers of an elastomeric high-strength acrylic coating that will reduce surface temperatures. The coating will also contain a non-slip layer for safe traction. These layers of paint will then cure for a week. It is anticipated that this project will occur over a month period later this year when temperatures are more favorable.

"The shipyard has always been committed to building the best ships and working with the best people," said Newport News Shipbuilding's Brandon Griffin, project manager for re-coating the replica. "Partnering with The Mariners' Museum to re-coat the USS *Monitor* replica is a challenge and an honor, and I think the final result will speak for itself."



View conservation in action

Watch from the observation deck as conservators drain special treatment solutions from the large artifact tanks. Draining the tanks will help conservators perform hands-on stabilization of USS *Monitor*'s gun turret, steam engine and other large artifacts. These tanks are generally only drained once a year, so don't miss this rare opportunity to see USS *Monitor* artifacts from a whole new perspective.

Be sure to attend this program for a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to handle ironclad history!



New addition to Library staff

This May, The Mariners' Museum Library at Christopher Newport University gained a new staff member. Sarah Puckitt, hailing from Montgomery, Alabama, is the new Curator of Photography/ Photo Archivist.

Puckitt's first project will be managing the three-year grant from the Council of Library and Information Resources that focuses on cataloging 48,000 19th and early 20th century photographic negatives. She has extensive knowledge of national digital initiatives, which will help the Library join the national conversation on digitizing its resources.

Puckitt's museum experience includes several years at History San Jose, a regional history museum and library in California. She mounted several exhibitions including a panoramic photography exhibit featuring more than 35 historic panoramas of people and places in the Santa Clara Valley, and an exhibit on early California car culture, taken from one family's photographic albums in the early 1900s. Most recently, she established best-practice guidelines and managed the digital assets for the Montgomery Museum of Fine Arts (Montgomery, Alabama).

She earned a Master of Fine Arts degree in Photography from San Jose State University, San Jose, California. During her

undergraduate study, she learned 19th century photographic processes such as cyanotypes and gumbichromate prints. This background, along with postgraduate photographic preservation studies at the George Eastman House, Image Permanence Institute and Northeast Document Center (NEDCC), will serve her well in her new position at The Mariners' Museum Library.


Meet a Member

Anatomy of a Collision

Presented by CAPT. Robert Meurn September 24 • 7 P.M.

The Fall Lecture Series kicks off on September 24 at 7 p.m., when Captain Robert J. a Master Meurn, Mariner and Professor Emeritus at the Merchant Marine Academy, speaks about his book, Anatomy of a Collision. The book examines the 1956 wreck of the Andrea Doria and discusses how to prevent such tragedies in the future.

At the US Merchant Marine Academy in

New York, researchers are pioneering new techniques for preventing maritime disasters. The Academy's Computer Assisted Operational Research Facility (CAORF) uses a bridge simulator to research the causes of ship

collisions and other disasters and to figure out ways to stop them from happening in the future.

This occasional series highlights the continuing story of the USS *Monitor*, which is unfolding everyday in the Batten Conservation Complex at The Mariners' Museum. Mariners' Museum and NOAA curatorial and conservation staff will present these informative, illustrated presentations.

JULY 18

"Where Two Opposing Forces Meet: Franklin Buchanan and David Farragut at Mobile Bay"

Presented by John V. Quarstein, Chief Development Officer of the USS *Monitor* Foundation

Besides the epic battle of Hampton Roads, the Battle of Mobile Bay is one of the most iconic engagements of the Civil War at sea. This encounter pitted the Civil War's only two full admirals, David Glasgow Farragut and Franklin Buchanan, in a classic confrontation for the control of the blockade runners' haven Mobile Bay.

Farragut's clarion call to action, "Damn the Torpedoes...Full Speed Ahead," as his fleet stalled in front of Fort Morgan when the USS *Tecumseh* had been sunk by a torpedo, is one of naval history's greatest statements.

Both admirals provided inspirational leadership during this battle on August 5, 1864, which witnessed a major Union victory.

"Why Is It Going to Take So Long to Get the Turret on Display?"

USS *Monitor* conservation staff are often asked, "Why is it going to take so long to get the gun turret and other artifacts on display?" This lecture will provide an overview of the treatment processes for some of the signature objects within the *Monitor* collection.

Explanation will be given as to why conservation will take so long. The presentation will focus on the challenges associated with the preservation of the largest marine archaeological metals project in the world, and give the audience a front-seat view into the decision-making process for artifact treatment.


